that God is doing in and through our church. The weekend ended with our friends of the Macedonia Church as they re-consecrated their new church on West Avenue, Norwalk. For 37 years this congregation has been waiting for a true church home. Fifteen members began worshipping in the house of Pastor Steven's father, and this growing congregation has rented 7 other locations as they "wandered in the wilderness," moving from place to place without a permanent home. On Sunday night, Oct. 18, they finally reached, "the Promised Land." They completed Phase I of the renovations of their new building on 39 West Avenue in Norwalk, (the yellow "Pumpkin Church" as it was known when it was formerly owned by the Methodists) and celebrated the reopening of this 19th century house of worship with a two-and-a-half-hour service of re-consecration. About 20 members of Noroton joined with Pastor Dewitt Stevens, Ir., Macedonia Church members and visitors who formed a congregation of more than

600 people. Every seat was taken as we praised God for this permanent home. Macedonia is a vital congregation that has a tremendous vision to minister to the needs of their Norwalk neighbors. Being there that night has to be one of the highlights of my 30 years in ministry!

Pastor Stevens took time to personally thank us for the long-term support he and his church have received from Noroton Presbyterian Church. Grants from our Foundation for the Future mission grant process allowed them to begin the more than I million dollars of renovations needed to bring this historic treasure up to 21st century standards. What a great day it was to be your Pastor and receive, on your behalf, the heartfelt thanks of so many in this congregation for our partnership in this project. Psalm 133 reminds us, "how blessed it is to be in unity" with our brothers and sisters. In this day and age of great racial divide, I am profoundly grateful that our two churches have worked together for decades to bridge just such a divide. So thank you once again Noroton family for your gifts of generosity, to be a blessing to our brothers and sisters in this historic opportunity to grow their ministry.

The First Thanksgiving

In 1949 when there were many "displaced persons" needing a safe home after the II War, our church decided to sponsor a family. At that time the church owned a house located where the Memorial Garden is today. Since it had belonged to the White family it was known as the White house. The lower floor was rented during the week by the Darien chapter of the American Red Cross. On the weekends, however, the space was used for Sunday School. The Session decided that the kitchen on the first floor plus the entire second floor could be made available to a refugee family. The rooms were painted and furniture was collected from church families.

On April 4, 1950 the Louis Orban family, refugees from Hungary who had been living in a displaced persons camp in Germany, arrived in New York City on a converted troop transport ship—the General Blatchford. It had been a navy ship during the war but was transferred to Military Sea Transportation Service where it carried many refugees to the U.S. and to Australia. A group of NPC members met the Orban family at the ship and brought them to their new home in Darien. The family was father Lajos (Louis), mother Ilona (Helene), and three sons Louis Jr. (9), Ervin (4 1/2) and Gabor (3 1/2). A fourth son, George, was born four months later in August in St. Joseph's Hospital where the Tully Center is today. Louis Sr. was an engineer in Hungary but he began work for a member of the church who was a nurseryman. In a short while he found a job working for the Electric Specialty Company in Stamford.

By March of 1951, less than a year after arriving, the Orbans began hoping to find their own home. By August of 1952 Louis Sr. had secured a good job in Kalamazoo, Michigan. He and Helene found a house near a Hungarian Reformed church with over 100 Hungarian families. At the time of their departure the church gave them furniture and a loan which was fully paid by March 1954.

Seven years ago, George, the son born in Stamford, contacted the church and said he was coming east and wanted to see where he was baptized on November 5, 1950. In his letter he said, "We will always be grateful to the Church for its support and kindnesses in getting our family started in the New World." In the history files of the church there is an essay written by son Ervin when he was 16 years old. It is handwritten and his teacher has written the following on the top. "A+ This is really excellent. I have read it several times and get more from it each time."

The First Thanksgiving (written 65 years ago by Ervin Orban)


No doubt my title is somewhat misleading. You may think that I am going to tell about America's first Thanksgiving. Yet, I am going to tell about the first Thanksgiving, my first Thanksgiving.

My family and I came to America in 1950 from Germany. My parents suffered great hardships and much dan-

ger during the great War. They fled to Germany where I was born several hours after they arrived. In Germany we all suffered extreme hardships. I could truthfully say that a book could be written of my family's adventures in the War.


Late in the forty's things were getting so bad that it was doubtful if we could survive one more year and stay together. Through much work and luck, the news came to us that we were to go to America, where we were told we could get a new start in life, the third start from "scratch". I'll skip a lot of detail about how we got here and start with our arrival. We arrived in New York on a beautiful sunny day on April 4, 1950. We passed Miss Liberty holding high her torch of freedom and promise. When we docked, we were greeted by our sponsors. They were very wealthy people from Connecticut. They gave us a warm welcome and immediately took us to the village of Noroton on the seashore. That very night for the first time in over five years, including the ship, we slept on white sheets in a hundred year old beautiful old English style house. (It was more New England style than old English.) The house was owned by the church next door. This church was a sponsor for us. It was hard to believe, from the time of arrival to that same night, we moved into a completely furnished house, stocked with food and toys and clothing. I will never forget that night when I saw our playroom. How my mother cried. Everyone was so kind and friendly and helpful. Our friends took care of all our needs. We didn't have to pay rent, electricity or water. They found

a job for my father, for we were absolutely penniless. All the clothing we owned, we wore. To us, this was like landing in heaven.

In the following November of that year we observed the American holiday, Thanksgiving, at our sponsor's home. Here we came in contact with one of the American holidays. Our family will always remember and treasure this day. We truly had a lot to be thankful for. Most Americans don't realize fully what

to be thankful for. Our country in the last century has never been invaded nor bombed. This country has never produced mass refugees. Thanksgiving was set aside, so that we could at least one day of the year count our blessings. To us, each day was a blessing. Each day in Germany was a blessing. We survived the bombing in Hungary, we escaped unharmed. For five years we lived in dire poverty in Germany with always a little something to eat. This was a blessing. True, we lost hope and despaired many times. But, somehow we made it. Our whole family of six (the sixth arrived in America) came through healthy, together and happy in America. We knew what to be thankful for. Each decent loaf of bread was a treasure. A new pair of shoes for the ones I lost was a miracle. My mother hauled wood and peat in three foot snow with a feeble pair of boots on. Yet she made it to America.

I won't go on anymore. I would just like to say that Thanksgiving at our home is an important day. We have been given immense wealth and richness through much suffering and tribulation. That day in Connecticut was and is a landmark in our lives, far from our home where my ancestors lie in peace and all my relatives live in continued misery.

Second, I am grateful to God for those who have recently joined our Noroton Presbyterian Church family through the new members class. What a joy it was to spend an afternoon getting to know them and to welcome them into fellowship.

Third, I am thankful for those who have taken part in small groups as a part of our year-long series, #TogetherInTheStory. Continuing to learn about God's Story and thinking about how our stories of faith and life fit into it provides an opportunity to see where God is at work in our lives. In addition, it gives us the chance to join in God's work as well.

Psalm 136 has been a favorite of mine for a long time. It includes the refrain, "his love endures forever." As we enter into the season of Thanksgiving, may you know God's enduring and faithful love.

Spiritual Connection of Marriage

If you ever get the chance to see the one-man comedy Defending the Caveman I highly recommend it. It plays all over the world and offers a comical yet honest depiction of male and female dating rituals. Describing men as hunters and women as gatherers, the ultimate goal is survival and two partners working together is better than one person working alone.

We have learned so much about the attachment between partners since the caveman era. Research in the field of couples therapy has found the essential element of a healthy marriage is actually not the way couples work together, have the same interests and opinions, or even share common traits. Rather, a healthy marriage is based on a couple's ability to be emotionally responsive. This is where individuals trust and connect to their partner in a way that assures them the other person will always be there when it matters most. The connection can be felt in many ways including the way we talk, make eye contact, fulfill the other person's needs, or say "thank you" when he or she impacts us during the day.

It is in the presence of the Holy Spirit that couples are able to love as Christ intended. When we are full of the Holy Spirit and recognize Christ's love we are able to give our partner the emotional responsiveness he or

she needs to trust us and feel connected to us. If we do not feel the Holy Spirit we are more apt to selfishly take from our partner in hopes that this will fill us up. Paul's famous paragraph on marriage in Ephesians instructs us to love our partner the same way that Christ loves us. In Tim Keller's book "The Meaning of Marriage" he reiterates that couples should sacrifice for one another, consider the interests of their partner, build him or her up, serve them, put their needs ahead of your own, and serve each other in this way intentionally, intensely, and often.

How does this translate to everyday life? There are many opportunities throughout a day when we are asked to do things for our partner. Next time will you choose to serve your partner with joy of the Holy Spirit, and the love of Christ, or will you chose to meet your own needs first? A marriage will thrive when BOTH partners choose to serve. This is the moment we experience emotional responsiveness, trust our partner, and feel truly connected.



Pray More!

You may remember from last month that there is a group of NPC-ers who are considering ways we can be more about prayer. Well... here is another true story about how prayer worked in the life of one of the group members. Enjoy.



In my version of religion, I just don't spend much time thinking about the devil. I'm wired to think more about the positive than the negative. The devil is Captain Negative, so I don't give him much attention. Or so I thought.

So about a year ago, in a breakout group at Men's morning study, an 80-year guy shared with us that he tries to avoid getting cross . . ."because when you let yourself get angry, you're opening a window for the devil to come into your thoughts." I'd stored that idea on my mental back-up drive, not that useful on a daily basis to a guy wired like me.

This past Monday, I was trying to have a meditative conversation with my Maker. Okay I was quietly praying. Unfortunately, my mind kept being drawn back to a situation at work about which I was rather annoyed. Okay I was mad. One of my project leaders, while very gifted in technical competency, had severely alienated almost everyone on the team (two dozen folks) because he missed all the clues on how to influence the team's

culture. How could God gift this person so generously in valuable competencies, yet given the person so few skills in understanding the work culture? Really God, you can do better than this.

My anger was holding my mind hostage, or according to my friend, I'd let the devil into my thoughts and thus blinded me to seeing God's plan in this situation. Once I pushed the devil back out the window, God's plan was an amazingly clear gift to me. I discovered on Tuesday I had a major technical project, not requiring cultural influencing skills, much better suited for this person to lead. God's plan also allowed me to lift up a young person with a healthy balance of competency and culture to lead the project the other person was mishandling. With a minor shift in my perspective, or improved listening skills to my Maker, three lives were make richer -- the prior manager was better applied, a new manager elevated, and my calm restored and appreciation for seeking God's plan for me reinforced. Thank you our Father. Amen.

How To Build A Playground



1. Start well in advance. Planning for the NPCC playground began in 2014, and underwent several revisions,



2. Find the right talent. We were fortunate to find Tom Bush, owner of KidSpace, Inc. His background in industrial, architectural, and playground design along with his experience, creativity, and team approach made him the ideal choice to custom build our playground.



3. Define your vision. When designing our playground, we envisioned an outdoor classroom that would accommodate children under five years old. We wanted our classroom to offer a variety of explorations including science (water, sand and gardening), math (loose parts for building), art (easel and chalkboard), music (musical fence), imaginative play (stage and playhouse) as well as active play 12 (bike track and slide).



4. Keep it natural. There are a multitude of reasons as to why nature is beneficial to children. It supports creativity and problem solving, enhances cognitive abilities, increases physical activity, improves social relations, improves selfdiscipline and reduces stress.

5.Test it. It is extremely important to recruit the proper testers. The alternating looks on their faces of intensity and joy alone will tell you if you are on the right path to effective playground design.



6. Celebrate. We officially opened the playground gates on Wednesday, October 14. Needless to say, it was an incredibly joyful day!



7. Give proper credit and thanks. Pictured is Tom Bush (center left) with his assistant Sean Hutton (center right), along with a group of very grateful and appreciative clients.



8. Share. The playground is open to children under five with adult supervision during the hours that NPCC is not in session. We are excited to share the fun and learning the playground brings with the community.

ore than twenty-five years ago I posed for a picture with other classmates as a student at Meridian Junior High (Kent, Washington).

If memory serves, my classmates and I were selected at random for the picture as we entered the building that morning—an effort to highlight a new mural that had been painted at center-court of the gymnasium. I had long forgotten about this picture and many of the people who posed along with me—until just recently.

Late last month, a fellow classmate of mine posted a copy of the picture online and invited fellow alums to tag ourselves in the picture. It didn't take long for me to find a much younger version of myself in the picture and to add my own tag. As I scanned the picture to survey others who had posed for the picture, I was instantly transported back to a time, that aside from some rather vague recollections, was almost entirely forgotten—or so I thought.



Our memories are funny like that. Sometimes the smallest object or faintest picture will trigger a whole flood of memories—people, events, and even past emotions that we thought were lost were merely tucked away. I certainly experienced that here, and wonder if our newest class of confirmands might one day find themselves having a similar experience in the future when they encounter pictures from this time? What will they remember?

In Deuteronomy 6:6-9, we read, "These commandments that I give you today are to be on your hearts. Impress them on your children. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up. Tie them as symbols on your hands and bind them on your foreheads. Write them on the doorframes of

your houses and on your gates." I think that this impressing, talking, tying, and writing is an effort to make a lasting memory for the younger generation—memories that will not only be recalled, but will actually help to shape faithful disciples.



We celebrated this past month the completion of confirmation with 29-students (pictured). At the same time, we are beginning a new class (that includes 40-more confirmands). And as we begin the journey with this new group, we are starting something new, though this is certainly not a new idea. Each confirmand will have a sponsor who will walk with them throughout the confirmation experience—meeting with them, praying with/for them, and being in conversation with them using a set curriculum. I think this is going to be an incredible experience for our confirmands—but an even greater experience for sponsors!

So maybe I'm being a little nostalgic here—but I am not sure if mentor entirely captures the sponsor role. Perhaps we might also consider these people as "memory makers"—and significant memory makers at that. 



orton Presbyterian Church Annual Mission Retreat took place on Saturday, Sept. 26 in the new Mission room.

Our special guests and partners in ministry were Pastor Dewitt Stevens, Jr. and Elders from Macedonia Church, Norwalk. Our partnership with Macedonia goes back decades and God has blessed our relationship. A Foundations for the Future Mission Grant has enabled Macedonia to carry out extensive renovations on

a new permanent church home after 28 years of worshipping in a room above a store.

Pastor Dewitt Stevens of Macedonia Church opened with prayer, song and readings from I John 4:19 "We love because he first loved us." Along with Matthew 25:40 "Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me."

Pastor Stevens also updated NPC on the progress of the Macedonia Church. Pastor Stevens touched upon "The Great Commission" reading from Matthew 28:19-20 "Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, teaching

them to observe all that I commanded you; and Io, I am with you always, even to the end of the world." As the church goes through this transition from the old space to the new location, their church is preparing to grow with more members, ministry and ways to glorify God.

Macedonia Ministries

Prison Ministry – Juan Sanchez and Ray Dancy both gave moving personal testimony about how this ministry has shaped their life and so many others. Many of Macedonia's members (including elders and deacons) have come through the prison system and are living productive healthy lifestyles. As of 9/1/15 there are approximately 842 incarcerated persons in Bridgeport Correctional Facility and between 40-60% identify as being protestant. Macedonia ministry goes in to lead Worship services and Bible Study and also visit on Christmas day to take gifts and Worship.

Average number of participates in: Monthly services: 336 persons

Weekly spiritual development classes: 152 persons

Correspondence / letter writing: 25 persons

Families impacted annually: 40

Macedonia is working towards getting their halfway house fully operational. They are working with the director for the charity New Life for Girls in New York and eventually hope to see the house being fully utilized.

<u>Care Unit Ministry</u> – Sandra Hart explained how this ministry works to provide clothing and food to members of the church especially the men who were ministered to in prison. Some of the men just have the clothes on their back when they are released from prison and they are in great need. The church aids them, so they don't relapse and end up back in prison. Any family in need can receive from this ministry. At the holidays they partner with New Canaan Congregational Church to distribute between 75-100 food baskets. In the future they would like to work towards always having hot soup available to anyone who comes into the church and at the new church location having a fully stocked clothing room and food pantry.

Youth Ministry – Janeen Reid (Pastor Steven's niece) along with Dr. Rumble work with the youth providing an array of services for various needs including; academic, social, spiritual, substance abuse,

depression, peer pressure and prevention of devious behavior. This ministry also does Angel Tree, sandwich making and offers social activities.

Outreach Ministry – Started as an AIDS Ministry this ministry has changed, as the disease has evolved into caring for HIV patients, families and a plethora of other services, including bringing people their favorite foods in the hospital and driving patients to appointments. Angelo Wilson and Addie Stevens have been helping coordinate these activities for many years and hope to see this ministry also grow with the new space. Pastor Sam offered that Macedonia is "filling the space that no one else is filling."

Our mission team then laid hands and prayed for our brothers and sisters from Macedonia.

The retreat continued with some time for prayer, lifting up the various missionaries and ministries NPC supports. Pastor Sam presented a PowerPoint of the last time NPC welcomed an immigrant family during WWII and some of its challenges and highlights. It was established that the Mission team would like to further investigate this possibly of sponsoring a family from the refugee crisis. A "Missions Due Diligence Task Force" will be created and meet, pray and discern if we are ready to commit to sponsor a family or fill another need. Please contact Stella Clarke if you are interested in joining the team to research this opportunity or if you would like to help in any way.

The team discussed plans for ministry over the coming year. Pastor Sam closed in prayer and asked for discernment for the NPC mission ministry and for God to be glorified in all things as we serve him over the coming year.
